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


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'A policy is successful insofar as it achieves the goals that proponents set out to achieve. However, only those supportive of the original goals are liable to perceive, with satisfaction, an outcome of a policy success. Opponents are likely to perceive failure, regardless of outcomes, because they did not support the original goals. (McConnell (2010: 39).'





IFSC

- IFSC: led to especially strong emphasis on high-quality office development with limited amount of residential development
- Exacerbated by the changing economic climate, as Ireland experienced an unprecedented economic boom
- Resulting mono-functional landscape isolated it from the surrounding communities and from Dublin city as a whole (reinforced by security gates, CCTV, and the 'Berlin Wall')
